Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources staff confirmed public reports of a liquid manure spill into backwaters of Allen Creek on Friday late afternoon, March 17.

Between 300,000 and 400,000 gallons of manure overflowed a cement transfer point when a line feeding into a large lagoon plugged up.

"An employee (of Larson Acres Inc.) spotted the spill, and the dairy went into its emergency response,' said DNR Waste Water Engineer Mark Cain by phone last Thursday.

"They did exactly what we want farms to do in this instance. They stopped the spill, cleaned up what Brodhead. they could, and reported it to us," said Cain, responding to an inquiry from the Independent Register about citizen reports of the spill.

Larson Acres is licensed to milk 2,800 dairy cows in a concentrated animal feeding operation at the junction of Highways 59 and 104. About six miles south, they also have a 1,200-cow heifer facility on ter Allen Creek. We are taking water County Highway B off of Highway



Parkview School District presents case for 'yes' on referendum

Parkview School District Superintendent Steve Lutzke spoke to an audience of three people at a referendum informational meeting held March 21 at Parkview Elementary. Before the meeting, Lutzke said that the sparse crowd was characteristic of the meetings, this being the fifth of seven

Another hearing was held March 27 at the Parkview Elementary library, and the final informational meeting is scheduled for the eve of spring elections, at 6:30 p.m., April 3, in the library of Parkview Elementary.

Superintendent Lutzke presided over a 45-minute PowerPoint presentation outlining the district's case for passing the referendum, citing economic, academic, and financial reasons for voting yes. Lutzke pointed to the district's exceeding expectations in the 2016 State Report Card that evaluates performance of public schools across the state. Lutzke also noted a downward trend in the number of students open enrolling out of the district since 2014. For every student who open enrolls from the district, \$7,000 in funding is lost, Lutzke said.

Lutzke touted the school district's fiscal constraint. The district's belt-tightening has come in the face posed referendum passed, Superinten-

of declining revenues, off 12 percent, or \$1.42 million, from 2011 levels of roughly \$11.5 million. The district will face mounting budget shortfalls in the immediate future: \$549,000 next year, \$1.07 million the next year, and \$1.6 million the year after that. Superintendent Lutzke said the district has actively been trimming the fat, eliminating 33 employees over eight years, "aggressively reducing' employee benefits, and reducing budgets for textbooks, custodians, athletics, and field trips.

Governor Scott Walker has proposed a bumping of the district's funding, adding \$239,000 for the 2017-18 school year and \$394,000 for the following year. Should these numbers hold, despite strong opposition and the proposed referendum pass, the district would balance its books for the upcoming school year and face a \$325,000 shortfall for the 2018-19 school year.

In a full-throated defense of the district's use of iPads in the classroom, Superintendent Lutzke said that technology should be considered just as important as reading or writing when considering a student's curricu-

Parkview School District residents would not see a tax increase if the promeeting. The tax levy would continue levels that district voters approved in the 2014 vote. According to a chart shown as part of the presentation, if the referendum fails, the tax levy on a \$100,000 home would fall \$88.09, the levy on a \$200,000 home would decrease \$176.18, and the tax levy on a \$300,000 home would fall \$264.27.

Superintendent Lutzke pointed to other districts in the area that have taken a tact similar to Parkview in raising funds for schools. Just in 2016, Clinton, Whitewater, Juda, Deerfield, Cambridge, Belleville, Brodhead, and Albany passed referendums.

After the presentation concluded, Orfordville resident Gregg Simpson offered his thoughts on the referendum, citing concerns that the district will return to the taxpayer trough in three years. Parkview School District's Tony Klein said the district is hopeful that such a retread will be avoided and that optimistic plans are laid to use the money in such a way that will prevent another futnding referendum.

Williams then urged the district to "get creative" in their efforts to shrink expenditures.

"It always come to taxpayers. Everybody is always putting the squeeze on us," he said. "We gave (the district) all that money in 2014, and we were thank you, thank you."

In response, Lutzke said that the district has two ways of generating revenue: levying taxes and receiving money from the state. Lutzke said the referendum funds are pivotal to preventing swelling class sizes, which would then push more students to open enroll from the district, costing the district state funds.

Parkview School Board President Clay Hammes said that if the 2014 referendum had not passed and the district used portable trailers as classrooms, property values would not have increased like they have. "Improvements in the village started with the referendum," Hammes said. "I look at the big picture, as improving the community.

Simpson said he did not believe the district was "blowing money" and characterized the district as "being in a difficult position.'

Amy Hume of Orfordville spoke strongly in favor of the proposed referendum. "I have children here, I grew up here, and the community needs this," she said.

After taking the district to task for not erecting more signs, Hume gave a ringing endorsement. "The education has been great," she said. "Thank you,

Green County herds recognized for milk quality

are well-recognized for producing the high quality milk that results in the production of some of the finest cheese in the world. Dairy farms are unique because efforts to produce a high-quality product must occur every day. The success of our dairy industry has been built on the consumers' confidence in the quality of our dairy products. The top Green County dairy herds will be recognized at the upcoming Annual Green County DHI Membership Luncheon for producing high quality milk based on their so-

Production of high-quality milk is dependent on maintaining excellent hygienic standards. Somatic cell counts are actually a count of the number of white blood cells present in a cow's udder. Since white blood cells are used by the cow's immune system to fight infections, a low number of these cells in the cow's milk are an indicator of healthy and infection-free udders and higher quality milk.

Conversely, a high SCC number indicates that at least one or more quarters in the udder has an infecto meet the task every day of producing a high-quality product. The Green County average SCC for all DHI herds on test in 2016 was 228,000 cells per milliliter.

The top three DHI herds in both the small-herd category and the largeherd category are being recognized for having the lowest herd linear score somatic cells counts for Green County dairy herds in 2016. The top three herds are presented with certificates, and the top herd in each size category also receives a large aluminum milk house sign sponsored by the Green County Milk Quality Council.

Top honors in the small-herd category (99 cows or less) went to High Road Dairy operated by Kim and Nick Hartwig of Monroe. They milk 74 cows and had a weighted somatic cell count (SCC) of 88,000/ml. and a linear score of 1.5. Second place in the small-herd division went to Shantell Holsteins, Monroe, and third place to Rock-N Hill Holsteins, Juda.

Gaining top honors in the largeherd division (100 cows or more) was Binders Holstein and Brown Swiss cows had a weighted average SCC of Kate Hendrickson, Belleville, and 56,000/ml. and a linear score of 1.3 third place went to Dave and Brian for 2016. Second place in the large- Brugger, Monroe.

- · Compressed gas cylinders, including propane bottles unless they are cut in half.
- · Oils other than petroleum products and petroleum by-products.
 - Alkaline batteries (AA, A, B, C,
- Computers/monitors.
- · Any other hazardous materials, hazardous wastes, or universal wastes.
- Refrigerators and CFC (Freon)-containing appliances are acceptable only if the CFCs have been removed in accordance with EPA regulations and documentation of that removal is provided.



TAX TIME 2017

IRS reminds seniors to stay alert to phone scams

With the 2017 tax season underway, the IRS reminds seniors to remain alert to aggressive and threatening phone calls by criminals impersonating IRS agents. The callers claim to be IRS employees but

These con artists can sound convincing when they call. They use fake names and bogus IRS identification badge numbers. They may know a lot about their targets, and they usually alter the caller ID to make it look like the IRS is calling.

The victims are told they owe money to the IRS and must pay it promptly through a preloaded debit card or wire transfer. If the victim refuses to cooperate, they are often threatened with arrest. In many cases, the caller becomes hostile and insulting. Alternately, victims may be told they have a refund due to try to trick them into sharing private information. If the phone isn't answered, the phone scammers often leave an "urgent" call-back request.

"The IRS warns seniors about these aggressive phone calls that can be frightening and intimidating. The IRS doesn't do business like that," said IRS Commissioner John Koskinen. "We urge seniors to safeguard their personal information at all times. Don't let the convincing tone of these scam calls lead you to provide personal or credit card information, potentially losing hundreds or thousands of dollars. Just hang up and avoid becoming a victim to these criminals."

In recent years, thousands of people have lost millions of dollars and their personal information to tax scams and fake IRS communication.

Later this spring, the only outside agencies authorized to contact taxpayers about their unpaid tax accounts will be one of the four authorized under the new private debt collection program. Even then, any affected taxpayer will be notified first by the IRS, not the private collection agency (PCA).

The private debt collection program, authorized under a federal law enacted by Congress in 2015, enables designated contractors to collect tax payments on the government's behalf. The program begins later this spring. The IRS will give taxpayers and their representative written notice when their account is being transferred to a private collection agency. The collection agency will then send a second, separate letter to the taxpayer and their representative confirming this transfer.

Information contained in these letters will help taxpayers identify the tax amount owed and help ensure that future collection agency calls are legitimate.

The IRS reminds seniors this tax season that they can easily identify when a supposed IRS caller is a fake. Here are four things the scammers often do but the IRS and its authorized PCAs will not do. Any one of the following is a telltale sign of a scam.

The IRS and its authorized private collection agencies will never:

- · Call to demand immediate payment using a specific payment method such as a prepaid debit card, gift card, or wire transfer. The IRS does not use these methods for tax payments. Generally, the IRS will first mail a bill to any taxpayer who owes taxes. All tax payments should only be made payable to the U.S. Treasury, and checks should never be made payable to third parties.
- Threaten to immediately bring in local police or other law-enforcement groups to have the taxpayer arrested for not paying.
- Demand that taxes be paid without giving the taxpayer the opportunity to question or appeal the amount owed.
- · Ask for credit or debit card numbers over the phone.

If you don't owe taxes or have no reason to think that you do:

• Do not give out any information. Hang up immediately.

- Contact the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration to report the call. • Use their "IRS Impersonation Scam Reporting" webpage. You can also call 800-366-4484.
- Report it to the Federal Trade Commission. Use the "FTC Complaint Assistant" on FTC.gov. Please add "IRS Telephone Scam" in the notes.

If you know you owe, or think you may owe tax, call the IRS at 800-829-1040. IRS workers can help you.

Remember, too, the IRS does not use email, text messages, or social media to discuss personal tax issues involving bills or refunds. The IRS will continue to keep taxpayers informed about scams and provide tips to protect them. The IRS encourages taxpayers to visit IRS. gov for information including the 'Tax Scams and Consumer Alerts'
