'Free Fun Weekend' set for this weekend in Wis. State Parks, Trails

Maybe your budget is a little tight right now, or work is not letting you travel far to take a breather in the fresh air, or spend a little time with loved ones fishing.

Whatever's keeping you from enjoying a little rest and relaxation on public lands, Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources invites you to a "Free Fun Weekend" this Saturday and Sunday, June 2 and 3. And Green County residents need not go far to find a state park or trail.

"Trail passes are not required on the Sugar River State Trail, or any other DNR-managed trails on June 2 and 3," said Paul Holtan, who covers communications for Wisconsin DNR. "Another trail through Green County is the Badger State Trail.

"Other properties nearby that are free this weekend include New Glarus Woods State Park, Cadiz Springs State Recreation Area, Lake Kegonsa State Park just across the Dane County line. In neighboring Iowa County. Governor Dodge State Park has a free fishing program from 10:30 a.m. to noon followed by a free program at 2 p.m. on preparing your catch for a fish fry," Holtan said in a statement on the event to the Independent Register last

On Free Fun Weekend, Wisconsin residents and visitors can fish for free. hike or bike state trails for free, enjoy free admission to state parks and forests and ride public All Terrain Vehicle trails for free, according to the DNR.

Wisconsin has counted as many as 14 million visits annually to its 95 state parks, forests and trails. Maintaining, staffing and providing protection on the properties poses no small expense to the state.

Bikers, cross country skiers, horseback riders, even in-line skaters visit 41 state trails alone, for which operation and maintenance on average cost Wisconsin just under \$70,000 a year. User fees typically generate just under \$30,000 a year, and Wisconsin makes up the difference with revenue from park admission stickers and camping

"Free Fun Weekend is a great time to get outside and try something you've never done before, or introduce a family member or friend to fees are waived.

something you've always enjoyed," said Department of Natural Resources Secretary Dan Meyer, in a release on this weekend.

"Whether it's fishing, hiking or riding the trails, experiencing Wisconsin's great outdoors during this weekend could just be the start of a new tradition for you," Meyer stated.

On Free Fun Weekend across Wis-

- · No fishing license is needed to fish any waters. This includes inland trout and Great Lakes trout and salmon fishing, which normally would require a trout stamp in addition to a license. Fishing rules such as limits on the size and species of fish that can be kept do apply, however.
- All state trail pass fees on all DNR-owned state trails are waived and cooperatively-run state trails also may waive fees.
- All state park vehicle admission sticker fees on all DNR-owned properties are waived.
- ATV registration and trail pass

Free fishing classes are geocaching, archery, t-shirt painting, scheduled at many state parks and a wildlife show, kayak demos, telepopular waters, including High Cliff, Kohler-Andrea, Lakeshore state parks and the southern Unit of the Kettle Moraine State Forest. Faster broadband on the way to Green Co.

This press release was issued by the Green County Development Corporation

Parts of Green County lacking adequate internet service will be getting from the Public Service Commission to the Green County Development Corporation.

With pledged matching funds of more than \$631,000, the Broadband Expansion Project will total more than \$1 million to increase access to high speed internet in Green County.

To accomplish this, GCDC is partnering with Bug Tussel WirelessTM to place four towers throughout the county in areas that are unserved, are underserved or don't receive sufficient speed. Adding these towers is expected to help 205 business locations and 1,482 residences.

The towers will serve the Town of Clarno, the community of Martintown in the Town of Cadiz, the community of Oakley in the Town of Spring Grove, and the community of York Center in the Town of York. The towers are expected to be on air by the first quarter of 2019.


Reliable high speed internet ac-

cess is vital for local businesses to stay competitive. It's also critical for the health and safety of citizens as it provides full internet access to law enforcement, fire protection and emerbroadband as part of a \$414,000 grant gency medical services, as well as educational opportunities for students who live in rural areas. The proposal drew wide support from first responders, local governments, businesses and private citizens.

In addition to the four tower sites approved under the Broadband Expansion Grant, Bug Tussel has several other tower sites that were previously approved and in progress in Green County. Sites east of Monroe, in Belleville and in Albany were scheduled for completion this spring, while additional towers in Exeter, Postville and Prairie View are scheduled to be on air by September. Bug Tussel is also working on site acquisition for towers north of Browntown, north of Monroe and in downtown Monroe. Those sites are expected to be complete by the end of 2018.

The Green County grant is part of a total \$7.86 million in broadband expansion grants throughout Wisconsin that were announced in April.

BTC Enterprise Center hosts Soil Sisters 2018 kick-off event

Connectivity took on a warm, personal feel often missing in a digital age last week at Blackhawk Tech's Enterprise Center in Monroe.

Food and fiber producer members of the Soil Sisters piled into the college center last Wednesday evening, May 9. Many of the more than 20 women who'll host farm events in the growing organization's signature event Aug. 2 to 5 took part in the pre-

With tasty samples, product displays and plentiful conversation, the women from three counties made it clear no one need wait for the summer fun to begin.

"We're real passionate about stewarding our landscape, meeting needs of our families and growing our communities," said Lisa Kivirist of Inn Serendipity, Browntown, in introducing team members of the group, which has grown from eight to more than 200 in just a few years. "Never underestimate the power of women to get things done, and do it with some good food and wine."

Networking throughout the 2-hour event last week at BTC displayed the Soil Sisters' contributions, which Kivirist recounted. Businesses have started as a result of these activities. Cooperative enterprises have formed. Candidates for local office and public service have emerged and won elections. And a whole lot of education and information exchanged.

"I've learned a ton from everyone in the group," said Ashley Wegmuller of Bo and Olly's Produce. "Soil Sisters members are not competitive; they're supportive, and they encourage networking.'

Wegmueller's tending more than 30 vegetable varieties on her family's Brown Swiss dairy farm east of Monroe. She has been gearing up to take part in the city's farmer's market this season, and she hopes to start a "farm stay" enterprise.

Betty Anderson, who operates a farm with husband Dane on Avon Road near Brodhead, was also taking part in the Soil Sisters preview last week. Tony Zgraggen, who crossed the street to the BTC Enterprise Center from his Alp and Dell cheese store, was glad she did.

"I came to support local businesses," said Zgraggen, as he sampled delicacies from the Andersons and talked to her about possibly selling their products in his store.

Alp and Dell carries more than 150 varieties of cheese from between 8 and 10 cheese factories, but especially Emmi Roth USA. It also has a viewing hall to the on-site cheese factory, with viewing open to the public Monday through Friday during the day.

Chef Stephanie Kind, who opened the Black Walnut Kitchen on Monroe's square in January, was also making the rounds at the Soil Sisters event, looking to source more local ingredients for her restaurant. A Navy veteran and reservist, Kind found more veterans among the Soil

Lori Stern, whose Cow and Quince restaurant in New Glarus will again feature Taste of Place during the Soil Sisters' kick-off to their 3-day event in August, also spoke briefly at the Enterprise Center in Monroe. Stern said she and her partner in the business now source 94 percent of their ingredients from businesses within 50 miles of New Glarus.

Wisconsin Farmers Union is a key sponsor of the Soil Sisters event. Pat Skogen, new president of the Green Rock, Lafayette South Central Chapter, attended the event last week, too. The chapter is only a few years old and already has more than 250 mem-

"I truly believe that the future of local agriculture has got to be feeding our local communities," Skogen said. "WFU women members have always shown up to lead. Soil Sisters is simply taking it a step further and supporting each other."

Wisconsin Small Business Development Center (SBDC) Network announced in late January that it is partnering with Green County De-

velopment Corporation (GCDC) this year to boost small business startups and growth.

GCDC received a \$40,000 Wis-Economic Development Corp. grant to implement an entrepreneurship support strategy here. The effort is engaging, assessing and providing mentorship and coaching resources to current and aspiring en-

"We're delighted to have the Soil Sisters members here for this preiew in the Enterprise Center and to help grow our local businesses," said Cara Carper, GCDC Executive Director. "We only had our grand opening a couple of weeks ago, and we've had 3 to 4 events a week since.

"It's especially nice for people who work out of their homes or personal space to be able to meet clients here," Carper said., "or when a lot of business owners like this can get together to showcase their products and services. BTC can provide training to the business owners here, too. Businesses could potentially get instruction, or BTC provide or arrange needed training."

GCDC hopes to create 15 to 20 jobs and assist firms in securing investments of more than \$1 million. In addition to the SBDC consulting, GCDC is championing a countywide mentorship program as it uses this new space called The Enterprise Center at Blackhawk Technical College in Monroe.

GCDC helps individuals who are starting a new business, growing an existing business or looking for a new location, according to its website. GCDC provides direction to data, available buildings and sites, labor force information and demographics. It can also help them access incentives and financial assistance

"The goal of this program is to give new businesses a good start, to




