Fair's premier exhibitors earn accolades, prizes

12th annual Green County Premier Exhibitor contest was held at the recent Green County Fair. The event is designed to recognize 4-H and FFA members who have shown "exceptional involvement and knowledge" in their project area, according to an Extension Green County news release.

The Premier Exhibitor contest is open to any exhibitor of swine, dairy, beef, sheep, goats, rabbits and poultry, and is divided into two age divisions. The junior division is for exhibitors in grades three through eight and the senior division is for exhibitors in grades nine and up. There is also a platinum division for youth in the senior division who have previously won first place in their respective species. Youth who participate in this division are tested on all species rather than just their own.

During this event, contestants participated in showmanship, and a "skillathon" and took a 35-point knowledge quiz. The skillathon consisted of four stations: breed identification, equipment identification, meat and cheese identification and feed identification.

Drought declaration includes Green and Rock counties

The United States Department of Agriculture has designated Winnebago County, Illinois, as a primary natural disaster area because of drought conditions.

Although Winnebago is the primary county eligible for disaster assistance, the contiguous counties of Boone. DeKalb, Ogle and Stephenson in Illinois and Rock and Green in Wisconsin also are eligible for assistance.

The secretarial natural disaster designation allows the USDA Farm Service Agency to extend emergency credit to producers recovering from

natural disasters through emergency loans.

Emergency loans can be used to meet various recovery needs, including the replacement of essential items such as equipment or livestock, reorganization of a farming operation or the refinance of certain debts. FSA will review the loans based on the extent of losses, security available and repayment ability.

Healthful hint Private wells should be tested annually

Did you know that Rock County has more than 11,000 private wells? Regulations that protect the public drinking water systems don't apply to privately owned wells. If you own a private well, you should regularly monitor for any contaminants to ensure the continued safety of your water.

On average, only about 800 Rock County wells are tested each year for bacteria or nitrates. Of those wells, 17% test positive for bacteria, and 25% of wells have unsafe levels of nitrates. Testing your water annually is an

The Rock County Public Health Department maintains a certified lab that offers multiple water testing

services. Water testing kits are available to test private wells.

• Order a kit online by visiting the Rock County Public Health Department website: www.co.rock.wi.us/ publichealth-environmental/ publichealth-water-quality/ publichealth-health-lab (shipping and credit card processing fees may apply).

• Request a test kit in person. You can stop by the Rock County Public Health Department during regular business hours to request a test kit. Bacteria and nitrate tests are \$25 each and paid for when the water sample is returned to the Rock County Public Health Department.

• Kits for additional tests are available through the Rock County Public Health Department, with testing provided by the Wisconsin State Laboratory of Hygiene.
