Programs link farmers, schools, businesses

Register today for Thursday webinar

Help restoring local food chains – for schools, businesses, and producers – is the focus of a pair of webinars held yesterday.

Wisconsin Farmers Union and Wisconsin Department of Agriculture and Consumer Protection hosted "Bridging the Gap: Connecting Farm to School" at noon Tuesday.

Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction staff joined in to share how school food service staff can connect with local food growers. The program provided information on Wisconsin School Procurement Methods, including new policies and waivers that emerged as schools faced supply chain disruptions, according to a joint press release.

USDA Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) is also holding a webinar at 2 p.m. Thursday on its Local Food Purchase Assistance Cooperative Agreement Program.

Eligible state and tribal governments have until Tuesday, April 5, 2022, under this program, which will award up to \$400 million for emergency food assistance purchases of domestic local foods.

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

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



Preliminary deer hunt totals show harvest down According to final numbers

from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, the total nine-day firearm deer harvest was down 7.9% statewide compared to 2020.

Buck harvest was down 1.3%, while antlerless harvest was down 13.2%.

Preliminary figures show that hunters registered 175,667 deer during the 2021 nine-day gun deer hunt - including 84,952 antlered and 90,715 antlerless deer. Since archery seasons opened Sept. 18, hunters have registered 270,046 deer statewide, showing the growing influence of earlier seasons on cumulative harvest.

The Northern Forest management zone showed harvest increases from 2020 for both antlered and antlerless kills, while the other three zones showed declines in harvest. The Central Forest (-3.0%) and Central Farmland (-8.9%) had similar declines in total harvest from 2020 levels, while the Southern Farmland showed a larger decline in total harvest of 17.0%.

Adams County's Central Farmland led the state with over nine deer registered per square mile. Vernon County led the Southern Farmland Zone with almost six deer registered per square mile. Oneida registered the most per square mile in the Northern Forest Zone at 4.5, and Eau Claire's Central Forest registered almost 3.5 deer per square mile.

While opening weekend saw mild temperatures throughout the state with some snow in the north, DNR staff across the state reported good weather throughout the season. Snow cover and frozen wetlands would have improved visibility and access for hunters.



Evansville State Wildlife restoration project near completion



The Evansville site in Rock County is being restored as part of Wisconsin Wetland Conservation Trust, a wetland mitigation program administered by the Wisconsin DNR. The black lines seen here show broken drain tiles and filled drainage ditches completed to restore wetland hydrology.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) will complete three wetland mitigation projects to restore wetland hydrology and vegetation to more than 150 acres in Sheboygan, Portage and Rock counties by the end of the year.

These restoration projects are funded by selling wetland mitigation credits through the Wisconsin Wetland Conservation Trust - a DNR wetland mitigation program in place since 2014. The credits are sold to developers to offset permitted wetland impacts resulting from development projects.

The Wisconsin Wetland Conservation Trust then partners with a diverse group of landowners, including farmers, municipalities and conservation groups to initiate projects in the same watershed where the development projects are taking place to prevent a net loss of wetlands. Credit fees are used to restore and enhance wetlands within the same watershed being impacted.

The Te Stroete project includes 31 acres owned by Sheboygan County near the Lake Michigan shoreline.

"Sheboygan County is excited to partner with the Wisconsin Wetland Conservation Trust to restore our Te Stroete project and expand on existing county conservation projects already on the ground in the area," said Aaron Brault, Planning and Conservation Director for Sheboygan County. "Projects like these helps reduce flooding, improve water quality and create wildlife habitat for our Lake Michigan watershed."

Conservation Trust is also working on restoring 74 acres at the DNR-owned Evansville State Wildlife Area in Rock County, and a third project in Portage County on privately owned farmland.

After the sites are restored and given time to establish, they are opened to the public for nature-based outdoor activities such as hiking.

To date, the Wisconsin Wetland Conservation Trust has allocated \$18 million to 14 different mitigation projects and has completed over 800 acres of restoration since 2019.

"The Wisconsin Wetland Conservation Trust is a great example of different landowners and the DNR working together. The program benefits developers, conservation and municipalities because development projects can be implemented while still protecting watersheds," said Josh Brown, DNR Wisconsin Wetland Conservation Trust Program Coordinator.

The wetland mitigation projects in Sheboygan, Portage and Rock counties began in 2019 and are the result of extensive site planning, data collection and regulatory review.

All Wisconsin Wetland Conservation Trust projects are protected by a conservation easement to ensure they remain as wetlands in perpetuity.

Long-term management of Wisconsin Wetland Conservation Trust sites are funded through an endowment managed by the Natural Resources Foundation of Wisconsin.

Wisconsin's dairy industry has been remarkably resilient throughout the pandemic, underscoring that America's Dairyland isn't going anywhere. Wisconsin's dairy industry is our past and our present, and it's our future, too," Gov. Evers said. "Since this program began in 2014, demands for grants have outpaced available funding," said DATCP Secretary Randy Romanski. "Our dairy processors here in America's Dairyland have a healthy appetite to modernize and innovate. Governor Evers recognized this, and in the biennial budget, doubled the funding for the dairy processor grants from \$200,000 to \$400,000 annually."

Grants will be awarded for projects up to \$50,000 and two years in duration. Processors are required to provide a match of 20 percent of the grant amount. Recipients will be chosen through a competitive selection process.

The grant application is available at datcp.wi.gov. Applications are due to DATCP Grants Manager Ryan Dunn at ryand. dunn@wisconsin.gov by 5 p.m. on Friday, Jan. 7, 2022. Grant recipients will be announced in February 2022.

In 2021, 15 companies received a total of \$200,000 in grants. Since its inception in 2014, DATCP has received 118 grant proposals requesting more than \$4.57 million. DATCP has funded 66 of those proposals totaling \$1.3 million.
