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## Recall election still on for Orfordville president

Village of Orfordville residents will likely go back to the polls later this month to elect a new village president in a recall election that officials believed previously to be “null in void.”

Former Village President Gary Phillips resigned on April 25, the same day a recall petition to remove him from office was turned in to Village Clerk Sherri Waege.

Waege could not be reached for comment but stated previously in an email she believed the signatures turned over to be null and void in light of Phillip’s resignation.

Rock County Clerk Lisa Tollefson said in a phone interview last week, “We all questioned (the relevance of the petition in light of the resignation) and went to the (Wisconsin) Elections Commission to verify.”

Even the petitioner, David R. Giddley, reportedly does not wish to see the recall election ensue, according to unofficial village minutes.

“State statutes are written in a way that once the train has left the station, you can’t bring it back,” Tollefson said.

The County Clerk provided 272 signatures that were included in the petition to recall Phillips. To kickstart the recall election, it was necessary to collect 25% of the number of total voters who

cast ballots in the 2018 gubernatorial election, she said – or 151 signatures.

The petition states in part, that the recall of Phillips was prompted because he created “a chain of command that puts himself in direct control of the police department leading to a hostile work environment. This led to the resignation of the chief of police, endangering our community and causing tensions within the village and with our neighboring communities.”

Police Chief Brian Raupp resigned from the Village of Orfordville April 4, giving no specific reason for his departure.

He has since been appointed police chief in the Village of Footville, which contracts its police services with Orfordville. The intergovernmental contract is now in its last days. According to the unofficial May 19 minutes, Footville officials gave the required 90-day notice to terminate its contract.

In a previous interview Phillips stated that he did not resign because of the recall petition, stating he believed the reason invalid because he said “it is impossible” to position himself to take control over the police department.

He resigned April 25 following the Village Board meeting and said his decision was not influenced by the recall.

“For the community to try and start healing, I figured it was best that I leave,” he stated previously, noting his original intentions were to complete his two-year term next spring and retire from local politics.

Newly-elected trustee Dennis Burtness took the reins during an appointment at a special meeting April 28.

Phillips stated that Burtness is well respected among the former village president’s supporters and opponents, and was pleased with the selection for his successor.

Burtness confirmed last week he will now be on the ballot for the recall election.

Deadline for those seeking candidacy was Tuesday. It was unknown prior to press time if any other candidates filed nomination papers.

According to Tollefson, if two or less candidates emerge, the election will be held on Tuesday, June 28. If more than two candidates file, a primary election will be held on that date, and a general election will be held Tuesday, July 26.

Per usual, polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

It is unknown what the

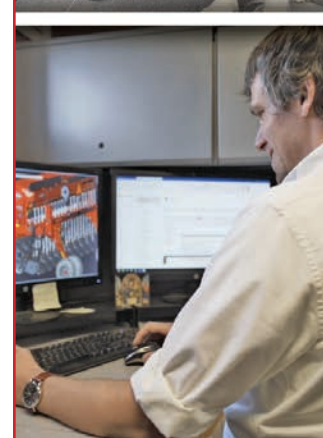
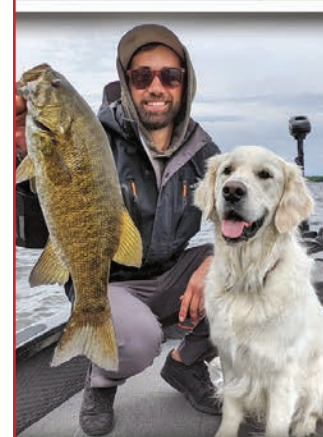
When not performing, she serves as the Music Director for Girls Rock Camp Madison. She is also the co-founder/producer of Flannel Fest.

The 9 angels for whom the scholarship is named include: Sheila Babler, Sandra Goecks Linda Hartwig, Joyce Kaderly, Linda Moe, Janice Siedschlag, Nancy Siegenhaler, Nelva Smith, and Doreen Williams.

The nine girls died when a Douglas DC-8, on a training flight at the New Orleans International Airport, crashed into the Hilton Hotel. The girls were staying there while on their senior class trip on March 30, 1967.

Orfordville Village Hall is located at 303 E. Beloit St.

The dumpster for the electronics recycling and volunteers will be behind the

Village Hall. There will be people there to assist you with unloading if you need help, according to a press release from Village Clerk Sherri Waage.

"Please keep in mind that, due to costs, this is only available to residents that live in the village limits of the Village of Orfordville," Waage said.

Nearly all electronics contain hazardous components that must be managed properly to comply with hazardous waste laws, according to the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.

"Just as we have confronted and addressed the social

issues of child abuse and domestic violence, we can find solutions to address elder abuse. The power to prevent elder abuse is in your hands. We can and must create healthier and safer living environments for older adults, including their homes, nursing homes, and assisted living facilities."

The sources of drinking water, both tap water and bottled water, include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.
