# Agency urges consumers to use caution

*There are many pitfalls when contracting for storm damage repairs*

The recent severe weather in Wisconsin resulted in damage to homes and businesses throughout the state, and additional storms are expected this summer.

The Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) urges consumers with property damage to use caution when interacting with unfamiliar or traveling crews that show up in the aftermath of a storm.

DATCP recommends consumers use trusted resources such as friends, neighbors, and insurance agents for contractor referrals. Consumers can also contact DATCP's Wisconsin Consumer Protection Hotline at (800) 422-7128 to check for complaints against a business before signing a contract.

To avoid fraud, the DATCP recommends homeowners seeking damage repair should:

- Request a copy of the

contractor's certificate of liability insurance.

- Check with the local building inspector to see if the necessary work requires a permit.

- Get written contracts with exactly what work will be done, what materials will be used, a start and completion date, and warranty information.

- Obtain lien waivers from any contractors paid for home repairs.

- Schedule a local building inspector visit before providing final payment to the contractor to ensure the work was completed appropriately.

- Keep records of all documents and receipts related to the cost of repairs and replacement of damaged items.

Wisconsin's storm chaser law aims to protect consumers and businesses, and prevent insurance fraud. Contractors:

- Cannot promise to pay

all or some of a property insurance deductible.

- Cannot negotiate with a homeowner's insurer on behalf of the customer. Contractors can only discuss damages and costs with the insurer with the customer's permission.

- Must inquire if the work requested is related to an insurance claim prior to entering into a contract with a consumer.

- Are required to notify consumers of their right to cancel the contract within three business days if the consumer is notified that their insurer has denied all or any part of the claim for work.

Main Street Monroe, Inc. has been designated as an Accredited Main Street America™ program for meeting rigorous performance standards, the organization announced last week.

Each year, Main Street America and its partners announce the list of Accredited programs to recognize their commitment to preserva-

tion-based economic development and community revitalization through the Main Street Approach™.

"We are extremely proud to recognize this year's 863 nationally-Accredited Main Street America programs that have worked tirelessly to advance economic vitality and quality of life in their downtowns and commercial districts," Patrice Frey, President & CEO of Main Street America, stated in a press release. "During another incredibly challenging year, these programs demonstrated the power of the Main Street movement to respond to the needs of their communities. I am inspired by their steadfast leadership and innovative solutions to drive essential local recovery efforts, support small businesses, and nurture vibrant downtown districts."

In 2021, Main Street America programs generated \$5.76 billion in local rein-

vestment, helped open 6,601 net new businesses, generated 30,402 net new jobs, catalyzed the rehabilitation of 10,595 historic buildings, and leveraged 1,427,729 volunteer hours. On average, for every dollar that a Main Street program spent to support their operations, it generated \$19.34 of new investment back into Main Street communities.

Main Street Monroe's performance is annually evaluated by the state of Wisconsin's Main Street Program which is the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation (WEDC).

WEDC works in partnership with Main Street America to identify the local programs that meet rigorous national performance standards.

Evaluation criteria determines the communities that are building meaningful and sustainable revitalization programs and include

standards such as, fostering strong public-private partnerships, supporting small and locally owned businesses, and actively preserving historic places, spaces, and cultural assets. Currently, fewer than half of the state's 35 programs are nationally accredited.

### Main Street Monroe makes its mark

Main Street Monroe is currently in its 17th year as a 501(c)3 nonprofit. It has been nationally accredited consecutively since 2015. That is the year current director, Jordan Nordby, started.

For this most recent year, Main Street Monroe, which is volunteer driven, reported more than 1,100 volunteer hours. This equals more than \$33,000 worth of donated time. Nordby is the only paid staff person.

In 2021, volunteers were present at all 46 events Main Street hosted in person and

virtually in addition to the 56 farmers market days it also operates.

This accreditation covers the second year of Main Street's pandemic support efforts.

Total efforts hit \$125,000 raised for local businesses through virtual LIVE! shopping nights and a Share the Love Gift Certificate Program of which Main Street provided matching funds for purchased gift certificates.

Main Street has welcomed multiple new businesses to the district and also assisted with and supported more than \$250,000 in small business grants since the start of the pandemic in Monroe.

"Every year the Accreditation provides us a framework to continue growing and helps highlight what needs to be focused on. The past year has been one of the most challenging, but also the most rewarding. I'm very excited that we have once again achieved the highest standard in our work," Nordby said.

### CHARLES EDWARD TROW

Charles Edward "Ed" Trow entered eternal life with his Lord and Savior peacefully on Sunday, May 22, after making a difference in this world for 95 years.

Ed was a Christian man who enjoyed the fruits of the earth and farmed his entire life working sunup to sundown with cattle, hogs and crops. He was still driving tractors well into his 80s and was the master of corn planting with his Case farm tractors.

In his lifetime, he saw farming go from plowing with horses to automated milkers. Ed served as Magnolia Town Chairperson for 10 years, was a faithful member of Albany United Methodist Church where he served on several committees including Sunday School Superintendent and was a Renk Seed Corn dealer for more than 25 years.

Ed was born on March 9, 1927, and grew up between Albany and Brooklyn. He was a 1945 graduate of Albany High School and was the last surviving member of his class. He was drafted to the US Army where he proudly served in the Korean War from 1951 to 1953 spending time in Germany.

Ed was honored at church with a quilt for his service in the war and also went on the Vets Roll 2013 trip to Washington DC with his son Bill.

Ed loved to attend dances at Turner Hall and the New Glarus Hotel with Charlene Holcomb. They were married on February 26, 1954, and became the parents of five children and farmed together in Magnolia Township. Ed's world was changed when Charlene passed away at an early age of cancer and Ed was left with raising five children ages 4 to 14 alone. June Houlberg started coming over to help out and on November 19, 1972, Ed and June were married and the family expanded to 5 more adult children. Ed and June always enjoyed their Sundays at church and restaurant lunches after. Ed's life was blessed with family,

many birthday dinner potluck get-togethers eating his favorite cherry pie, visiting with children and grandchildren, and cheering family on at high school sporting events.

After each visit from friends and family, he would always say, "Thanks for stopping, come again." As Ed's years began to wear – ("too many birthdays," he always said). Ed was blessed with new friends in his life, Barb Lawrence, Liz Detra, Jean Pick, the caregivers and residents at Albany Oaks Assisted Living, and Agrace Hospice. The family is forever grateful to the extra kindness and smiles they provided Ed with storytelling, treats, attention, and loving care.

# Albany solar project gets green light

Construction is poised to move forward on the Albany solar project after state regulators recently gave final approval to Alliant Energy's second phase of solar development plans.

According to a press release from Alliant, the 50-megawatt (MW) solar project in the Town of Albany will generate enough electricity to power nearly 13,000 Wisconsin homes.


Alliant Energy officials expect construction to create more than 100 jobs at each project.

"At Alliant Energy, we're driven by our commitment to serve customers and build stronger communities," David de Leon, president of Alliant Energy's Wisconsin energy company, stated in the release. "We are excited to break ground and begin construction on the Albany ... solar project, key components of our plans to accelerate toward a cleaner energy future. We

expect our solar development plans to create hundreds of new construction jobs and deliver safe, reliable, affordable energy for years to come.

The company expects to begin construction this summer and finish in late 2023. Alliant Energy will contract with Burns & McDonnell and utilize craft labor from several local union halls.

"We appreciate Alliant Energy's prioritization of local unionized labor on renewable energy projects," Emily Pritzkow, executive director of the Wisconsin Building Trades Council, stated in the release. "Alliant Energy understands the benefits of hiring local labor, the development of a strong workforce through apprenticeships and training, and the ripple effect it has on our local economies, and state as a whole. When businesses partner with the skilled forces of Wisconsin's unionized building trades, they know they're going to get a safe,

quality product that delivers superior value for everyone."

The Albany solar project is among 12 utility-scale solar sites Alliant Energy is developing as part of its Clean Energy Blueprint that will add nearly 1,100 MW of solar energy generation to Wisconsin's energy grid and help customers avoid more than \$1.6 billion in long-term costs.

In addition to powering

homes and businesses, the Albany solar project along with its sister project in Rock County's Paddock, will generate an estimated \$200,000 and \$260,000 respectively in annual shared revenues for their communities and counties over the next 30 years.

An 18-year-old Exeter man was arrested for possession of child pornography and four counts of child sexual exploitation following a months-long investigation.

According to a press release from the Green County Sheriff's Office, Nathan O. Widish was arrested on June 17 without incident after investigators executed a search warrant at his N9156 Dohm Drive home as part of an Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Investigation. An agent from Stateline Area Narcotics Team (SLANT) also assisted Green County in the arrest.

The investigation reportedly began with two cybertips from the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children made to the Wisconsin Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force.

Widish was being held at Green County Jail pending an initial appearance.




#### INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his or her name and address before being permitted to vote. Where ballots are distributed to electors, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot except that an elector who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the elector's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the elector of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Where marksense voting is used, the elector shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for whom he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the elector shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided and fill in the oval or connect the arrow on the write-in line. On referendum questions, the elector shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the elector shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to "no" if opposed to the question.

Where touch screen voting systems are used, the elector shall depress the button next to the party of his or her choice. The elector shall then depress the button next to the candidate's name for whom he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the elector shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write in vote. On referendum questions, the elector shall depress the button next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the elector shall depress the button next to "no" if opposed to the questions.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initiated by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. Not more than five minutes time shall be allowed inside a voting booth or machine. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in casting his or her vote may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the booth, insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The elector shall leave the polling place immediately.

An elector may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the elector's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the elector.


